## Vow #37 Do we respectfully bow to any person or anything?

"If, when I attain Buddhahood, humans and devas in the immeasurable and inconceivable Buddha-lands of the ten directions, **who have heard my Name**, prostrate themselves on the ground to revere and worship me, rejoice in faith, and perform the bodhisattva practices, should not be respected by all devas and people of the world, may I not attain perfect Enlightenment."

My age group is in between old and new Japanese values and norms, so I can understand both. In the old norms and values, I had people who I highly respected without doubt such as school teachers and elderly people. I could not look down upon them. I could not talk back to them, either.

**School teacher**: A school teacher said that a big rabbit lived and was pounding "*Mochi*" on the moon. My father said that it was not true! But I insisted the teacher said so in class and the teacher was right! I respected my teacher who was always right (for my age group). He was a kind of small god in my life.

**Old man**: After a Sunday Service, one old gentleman came to me and said, "Sensei, please don't call me Mr. Smith. Please call me Mark." "I understand what you mean, but I can not do that. Please allow me to call you Mr. Smith as usual. I can not call you Mark. It is because I was educated so." Then, he smiled at me and said, "if you say so.."

In the new values and norms, I recognize that younger age groups do not show respect to school teachers and old people so much. They call and treat the teacher as their friend. This attitude is based upon a sense of equality. It is safe to say that they lost any person they respectfully bow to. What do you think?

The vow says, "After a person has heard Namo-Amida-Butsu, the person respectfully and politely bows to Amida's World. People and devas around the person see him and show respect to the person." This is the way Nembutsu Teaching is spread.

In Buddhahood, a person who respects others is the person who others respect. Probably we have been missing this kind of world in modern society. Our eyes in mind can not find any person or anything we deeply bow to with respect and gratitude.

However, in Buddhahood, we regain those eyes to detect something irreplaceable. It is because Buddhahood is made to be so.

If there are leftovers, we invite anyone who will be able to visit a family member or friend in a nursing home or assisted living facility to take a plate to them. Thank you for your participation. Most of us, though, fall somewhere in between. We are always a bit anxious about the future precisely because we do not know what lies ahead. Whether the prospects are good or bad, it is always hard for us to open the door of change with full confidence. The New Year is a time of reflection. We can take stock of the past year, looking at the things that we learned and, if we are able to see things with some clarity we can see what worked and what didn't and we can throw open the door unafraid. We don't have to barrel down the hall and rush to open the door, (reflection takes time) but the longer we stand there in the hallway, the more comfortable the hallway becomes and we may find ourselves stuck out there, figuring that it is better to stand there than to face the unknown. We look back at the already closed doors of the past wishing we could return to them and believing that comfort lies behind them. We picture rooms full of warm light and soft furniture and forget that within those rooms there are also corners collecting dust and drawers full of junk that we can't get rid of. We forget that opening new doors means that we may be able to leave the junk behind or at least find brooms to sweep away the dust. We forget that those doors have been closed for a reason and, though they are never locked, they are not places we can remain in lest we, too, begin to collect dust. So as we move into 2017, we should all remember to open the new door as quickly as we can. We should go through the past year with a travelers mind, packing up and taking with us what we need and leaving behind what we don't. We have a chance to start fresh and should move forward with excitement rather than fear. Take time to re-invent yourself and the world around you and open that door with great gratitude for the fact that we have this precious and unrepeatable life that contains more possibilities than we can fathom. RE: HoOnko & New Year Celebration

#### この世に仏ましませば、生死(しょうじ・迷い)なし

父が36年前に危篤となり死んだ。簡単な病気で死んだ。59歳だった。アメリカに開教使として来たばかりだったが急いで帰国して4日ほど病院で話すことができた。「俺はもうダメだ」と幾度も口にする父にアミダブツの世界を話し、唯念仏申すことを勧めたのが最後となった。無常の世とはいえ涙が止まらなかった。

そして葬儀。実家は曹洞宗(禅宗)ゆえ禅宗の葬儀となり私は黙って座っていたが、経文の一文に「この世に仏ましませば、迷い(生死)なし」という意味の言葉が耳に入った。「ああ、そうなんだ。この世にお釈迦様が出て下さった。すでに迷いを超えた悟りの世界を私に開示している。いまだ私は迷っている身だが、この世に迷いを超えた世界がすでにある。光があれば闇は無い。仏法とはそういう意味だったのか」と感銘し、いまでもその一文を忘れない。

禅宗でいう「生死(まよい)なし」という意味を浄土真宗では「往生は一定(いちじょう)」と示す。「往生(おうじょう)」との意味は「死ぬところまで行く」のであり、その死の瞬間に「生まれる」ことをいう。「一定」とは「迷いを超えた世界がすでに動かし難く一つに定まっている」ということ。その世界(ダルマ)に生まれてこそが私の本来の命の相であり、私は迷いの中で虚しく人生を終えることは無いのだ、との意味である。迷いを超えた世界が私を待っている。私は死ぬのではなく、生まれるのだ、との意味である。


では「私は死なない(生まれる)」とはどういう意味なのだろうか。誰しも死んだら体は冷たくなり、石みたいに堅くなり、物も言えず、いずれは白骨のみが残るだけではないか。どう見ても死んだ私がどこかに「生まれる」とは思えない。このような人間の無常の相(すがた)は動かしがたい事実ではないか。だが、考えてみて欲しい。確かにそれは事実だが、はたして真実なのだろうかと。

もし、生きている間に過去・現在・未来の三世を貫き通すダルマを私が体験できたら、この朽ち果てる無常の身を抱えながらも「私は無常を超えたダルマに出会ったからこそ、私は死なない。死後私はダルマの中に生まれる」と言えるのではなかろうか。「過去」とは「すでに悟りが開かれた」ということであり、「現在」とは「その悟りが教えとなって私にとどいている」ということであり、「未来」とは「その世界に必ず入って行くことが定まっている」ということ。

『仏説阿弥陀経』には「その(アミダブツ)の国の衆生、もろもろの苦あることなく、ただもろもろの(真実の)楽を受く。ゆえに極楽と名づく」と出てくる。その極楽と名づけられた世界に生まれるには、自分の力量や計らいをひるがえし、勧められるままに、口にただ南無阿弥陀仏と称する。理解も、喜びも、実感も要らない。ただ念仏申すだけ。それって、空念仏ではないのか?念仏は「いなり寿司」みたいに自分の計らいで中身を詰め込む必要がないのです。 合掌、




#### Shotsuki Monthly Memorial Service





